

# South Grafton PTO Meeting Minutes

## January 15, 2020

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 pm in the MSES Computer Lab. Members of the board present were Robin Callahan, Tisia Ciesluk, Becky Miner, Mary Lou Butler, Allison Le May and Kristin Pliakas. There were 4 staff members and 5 parents present.

### **Parent Teacher Input:**

Superintendent Cummings gave a presentation on the past, present, and future of the Grafton Public School Department budget crisis. **Grafton currently spends \$12.2 million dollars less than the state average on education annually.** Should the override not pass, reductions in staff would be as follows:

- **FY21 7 positions will be eliminated**
- **FY22 11 additional positions will be eliminated**
- **FY 23 2 additional positions will be eliminated**
- **FY 24 10 additional positions will be eliminated**
- **FY 25 10 additional positions will be eliminated**
- \* **Class sizes could exceed 30 students at all grade levels, including kindergarten and first grade.**

**In FY23 75% of athletics will be cut. Adding in an athletic fee will bring in, at maximum, \$60k. This will come nowhere near to covering the cost of athletic programs in the district.**

Discussion took place regarding the domino effect of the override not passing. Should the override not pass, the district will lose the \$500k that is brought in from school choice because the district will no longer be an attractive option for students in other districts. Grafton will incur an extreme cost increase in outsourcing special education services because the programs and staff that currently keep these services in district face being cut. Grafton will also incur cost increases for students who decide to school choice to other districts that are better able to fund their public education programs. When the school system deteriorates due to underfunding, the property values of homes often follow suit.

To close the gap for level funding about \$3.7 million is needed from FY21-FY25.

Dr. Coakley discussed the amazing staff and their importance in the success of the students of Grafton Public Schools. If the override does not pass, staff will be eliminated, overworked, and unable to provide the services they currently offer.

Discussion took place regarding what efforts can be made to disseminate information regarding an override and how to encourage residents to vote.
